

Message from our Executive Director

Dear Friends,

2022 marks the start of my third year as Executive Director of the California Fire Foundation. While there have been challenges along the way, my overarching belief is ...

"I WAS LUCKY TO ESCAPE with my life. The smoke was so deadly that I couldn't even reach the front door and get my wallet and keys that were on a table just behind the front door," said Jason Vasquez, when fire ripped through his Anaheim home in June 2021.

The trauma experienced by survivors of fires and natural disasters is unimaginable. They often have to flee the scene with nothing more than the clothes on their backs and in the wake of a devastating fire or natural disaster, survivors desperately need comfort and financial

assistance. Easing that burden is what the California Fire Foundation's SAVE program is all about. "I lost everything, including id, wallet, phone, and money. The \$250 Supplying Aid to Victims of Emergency (SAVE) card gave me a place to stay, food, and ability to get a new phone. It really helped," said Jason Vasquez.

Through this program, frontline firefighters and select community-based organizations (CBOs) in California provide \$250 SAVE gift cards to eligible survivors of fire and natural disasters so they may purchase basic necessities such as

food, clothing, medicine or maybe a place to stay the night.

As the first line of protection during disaster, firefighters are on the scene witnessing first-hand, the shock and devastation of survivors as fire or natural disaster rocks their world. "The California Fire Foundation's SAVE program is incredible. To be able to hand people this amazing gift and for them be able to go buy gas or get a hotel room is such a simple gesture that people are so grateful for." said Fire Captain, Ken Smith, Chico Fire Department.

MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

DEAR FRIENDS.

2022 marks the start of my third year as Executive Director of the California Fire Foundation. While there have been challenges along the way, my overarching belief is we have made huge progress in increasing our assistance to those that need it most and in doing so we have stayed true to our mission of providing emotional and financial assistance to families of fallen firefighters, firefighters and the communities they protect.

The start of my role as Executive Director also coincided with the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. Over the last two years we have ridden, and are still riding, the storm of the COVID-19 pandemic and one of my first executive decisions was to reach out to community-based organizations and first ask, 'how can we help?' and second, made sure we delivered that help.

In the early days of the pandemic, organizations such as food

banks in underserved communities, were in unchartered territory due to this unprecedented crisis and had seen the need for their services increase by over 50%. Thanks in part to our corporate partnerships, we were able to provide funding and support as part of our ongoing disaster relief efforts to those organizations and aimed to ease the immense burden they faced.

Our grants program also aims to ease the burden on fire departments, firefighter associations and community-based organizations whose vital projects focus on keeping Californians safe. The Foundation opened its first grant cycle in 2018 and since then we have awarded over 400 grants totaling more than \$7.87 million in direct support for grantees actively serving high fire threat and/or under-resourced communities in regions throughout the state.

In my view, our grant program is all about making our communities better, whether that means enabling a fire department to purchase specialized firefighting equipment or giving a community organization the funds to rent goats to assist with vegetation mitigation and fuels reduction, the goal is ultimately the samewe want to make our communities better and safer place to be part of.

These great strides in our progress spur me on for the road ahead and while I am extremely proud of what we have achieved as a foundation so far, I am equally excited by the potential to assist yet more firefighters, their families and those in the communities they so proudly serve.

The SAVE program is available to any officially organized fire department or district and runs at no cost to them. The Foundation offers training materials and works with fire departments to help roll out this vital program, giving fire departments and districts the opportunity to help

people impacted by fire or natural disaster in their own community.

Our partnering fire departments are in a unique position to not only be the first line of protection during disaster but by offering the SAVE cards to survivors of a disaster, they are also the first to offer hope in their darkest hour.

To date, over 111 departments across the state of California are participating in the program. Fire Chief, Mary Gutierrez, Seaside Fire Department said, "The SAVE card is a small offering for residents who suffer loss after a fire but a large gesture in their eyes during their time of need. As firefighters we don't often get closure with our residents as it relates to emergency response. The SAVE card program allows us some positive closure with residents who experience traumatic events post fire, and the card always puts a smile on the faces of those who receive them."

EMERGENCY AID

During and following the devastating Camp, Hill, and Woolsey Fires of 2018, the California Fire Foundation mobilized direct assistance through local fire departments and volunteers. Over a three week period, cards were distributed at the FEMA center in Chico and at various locations throughout Southern California, firefighters and volunteers distributed over 10,000 cards totaling over \$2.6 million given in direct aid to survivors.

11 residents were displaced, and one was hurt when fire ripped through a Livermore Duplex one windy afternoon in March 2021. Joe Testa, the Deputy Fire Chief at the time was on the scene was able to distribute \$250 gift cards to each displaced family offering them a helping hand in their hour of need.

"The SAVE program had just been rolled out, but we were thrilled to be able to provide this support to those who had lost so much,' said Joe Testa, Deputy Fire Chief with the Livermore-Pleasanton Fire Department.

survivors with SAVE cards not only on the front line after structure fires but also during the aftermath of the Camp Fire at the FEMA center in Chico. "With the Camp Fire tragedy, an entire community was lost in 15 minutes," said Fire Captain, Ken Smith, Chico Fire Department. "After receiving the SAVE card, we had people return to the FEMA center and stand in line for an hour just to thank us."

In the aftermath of the devastating Camp Fire of 2018, that caused at least 85 civilian fatalities and destroyed over 11,000 homes, the SAVE card value was

\$250. This increase was possible solely due to the commitment of the Foundation's donors, large and small, and through ongoing generous donations from individuals and corporate partnerships the SAVE program can continue to thrive.

While the SAVE program is administered directly by participating fire departments across California each day, the program also mobilizes for rapid disaster relief when communities are impacted by wildfire or natural disasters.

Last year's wildfire season once again proved to be record break-

raging across the state. For the first time in the SAVE program's history, the California Fire Foundation worked with CBOs on the ground to assist with the distribution of the SAVE cards to those in need, ensuring they reach survivors as quickly as possible. Across the Dixie, Caldor and River Fires we disbursed over \$327,750 to those impacted.

These organizations are in a unique position to understand and recognize the immediate needs within their communities. Just as firefighters are often first to reach the frontline of fires, often CBOs are the first line of support to survivors of large-scale disaster at emergency aid centers and with their involvement in the distribution of the SAVE cards, we can get vital aid to those in need.

"This program had just been rolled out in the past few weeks, but we were thrilled to be able to provide this support to those who had lost so much," he said."

"We are witnessing first-hand the devastation and trauma people are experiencing when they come through our doors but the SAVE cards from the California Fire Foundation are like sending angels to allow us to help others," said Cathy Rahmeyer, Director of Operations at the Plumas Crisis Intervention and Resource Center.

"Simply put, it is thanks to donations that the SAVE card continues to offer those in need the hope to get them through disaster," said Rick Martinez, Executive Director, California Fire Foundation. "It is also thanks to the dedication of those distributing the cards, whether that is a firefighter on scene at a house fire

or an organization on the ground assisting with a major disaster, we are grateful for their assistance in getting these cards into the hands of those in desperate need."

WILLIAM R. **JAMES**

The Los Angeles Fire Department are

deeply saddened to announce the death of active-duty Captain William R. James. Captain James began his LAFD career on October 23, 2000. He was assigned to Fire Station 85, "C" Platoon, in Harbor City at the time of his at-home passing on December 11, 2021. Brother James is survived by his wife, daughter and son.



JONATHAN FLAGLER

It is with great sorrow that the LACoFD shares the line of duty death of Fire Fighter Jonathan Flagler. Fire Fighter Flagler sustained fatal injuries while battling a residential structure fire on Thursday, January 6, 2022.

Firefighter Flagler was a 21-year veteran of the fire service having served 19 years with the Vernon Fire Department before transitioning to the LACoFD in October of 2020. Remembered as a loving husband, father, uncle, friend, and brave team member, Brother Flagler leaves behind his wife and two sons.
