



Message from our Executive Director

"DEATH LEAVES A HEARTACHE

no one can heal, love leaves a memory no one can steal" - this Irish saying may be anonymous but the emotional sentiment encapsulates what the California Firefighters Memorial stands for.

This year marks the 20th anniversary of this most fitting of tributes to our fallen brothers and sisters. Unveiled on April 6, 2002, it is a lasting tribute to the men

and women who paid the ultimate sacrifice to protect their fellow Californians.

The California Firefighters Memorial located in Capitol Park, on the historic grounds of California's State Capitol in Sacramento, is a unique and stunning homage to more than 1,400 firefighters who have died in the line of duty since California became a state in 1850.

Over the course of a decade,

more than \$2 million was raised privately for the construction and maintenance of the California Firefighters Memorial with the majority of the funding from firefighters themselves. With the money raised the California Fire Foundation constructed the Memorial and to this day ceremonies and upkeep are funded through the Foundation.



On behalf of the staff and board members of the California Fire Foundation, thank you.



A FITTING TRIBUTE

THE CALIFORNIA Firefighters Memorial encompasses four elements - the Memorial Wall inscribed with the names of California firefighters who have died in the line of duty, two statues that immortalize these fallen heroes and an annual ceremony of remembrance for those whose names will adorn the wall.


The centerpiece of the California Firefighters Memorial is a stunning brushed limestone Memorial Wall that currently carries the names of the fallen. Individuals qualify for placement on the wall if it is officially determined that their death occurred either on duty or as a result of illness or injury directly related to their job.

This striking memorial in Capitol Park, depicts the heroism of the profession and the agony felt when a firefighter falls in the line of duty. The two bronze statues that flank the wall beautifully capture the essence of the firefighting profession. "Holding the Line" honors the profession of firefighting and depicts four firefighters in action working a hose line. The statue was created by renowned artist Lawrence Allen Noble.

On the other side, "Fallen Brother" honors our fallen heroes and portrays an anguished firefighter carrying his 'fallen brother'. The statue was created by Jesus Romo, a retired Sacramento firefighter.

COMING TOGETHER TO REMEMBER

since 2002, the California Firefighters Memorial Ceremony has honored those firefighters who have lost their lives from traumatic line of duty deaths or job-related illness. The solemn remembrance is steeped in the traditions of the firehouse and hundreds of firefighters, family members and grateful citizens gather in the heart of California's capital, to pay tribute to those who paid the ultimate price to keep us safe.

Since the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic, the memorial has looked a little different over the past two years. In the absence of an

in-person ceremony, the California Fire Foundation was determined to honor the fallen with dignity and respect and created a moving commemorative video for 2020 and 2021's California Firefighters Memorial Tribute to remember those who paid the ultimate sacrifice. This year we are pleased to be able to welcome those families whose loved ones' names were added to the wall in 2020 and 2021 to this year's in-person ceremony at 6:00pm, Saturday, July 30, 2022 at the Safe Credit Union Convention Center, 1401 K Street,

TIME HONORED TRADITIONS



The Pipes and Drums of California Professional Firefighters will once again be present at this year's Memorial. Playing in the great tradition of Scottish bagpipe bands, the group lends an air of dignity and honor to the ceremony.

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YEAR-ROUND WILDFIRE sea-

son is becoming the new normal in California and with each passing year the fires are becoming ever more record breaking and destructive. One fire department that knows all too well the effects of wildfires is Pine Ridge Volunteer Fire Department in Shaver Lake. When the Creek Fire ripped through their community in September 2020, 66 out of the 88 homes were destroyed along with 3 of the fire department's engines.

General Motors (GM) stepped up to lend a helping hand to Pine Ridge and 9 other departments in need throughout the state by generously donating 10 new Chevrolet trucks and SUVs.

"We were proud to support the

brave firefighters putting their or snowy areas that a traditional lives on the line to protect our communities from the growing threat of wildfires in California," said Terry Rhadigan, Executive Director, Corporate Giving at General Motors. "We hope that, with these vehicles, fire departments throughout the state will continue to have the resources they need to hold the line against these devastating fires and keep Californians safe."

"The GM High Country donation is now Pine Ridge's Patrol 68. Carrying 300 gallons of water and full Basic Life Support medical gear, it is one of our most popular first response rigs. Its 4x4 and off-road features also make it the best responder in muddy

engine couldn't go, and our older patrols would struggle with. We might also be the only patrol in the area with heated seats!" Chief James Parr, Pine Ridge Volunteer Fire Department.

Bishop Volunteer Fire Department received a Chevy Tahoe and immediately put it to good use. "In early January 2021, California's hospitals were surged and overwhelmed by the COVID-19 pandemic. In a desperate effort to meet the growing need for medical professionals throughout the state, CalOES put out an urgent need request for volunteer EMTs to respond to California's major hospitals. Still within its first few weeks of service to the

Bishop Fire Department, the Chevy, Tahoe was used to transport three firefighter EMTs from Bishop to Harbor Memorial Hospital, six hours away in Southern California. The EMTs worked in the emergency department, providing reinforcements to the beleaguered front-line staff working grueling night shifts in an inner-city hospital. At one time, there were 160 COVID patients on ventilators at that hospital alone, and the young EMTs received invaluable experience that they were able to bring back to their community. The new Tahoe made this trip possible – and comfortable – for their 17 days of EMS deployment, and brought them safely home to their families," said Chief Dell of the Bishop Volunteer Fire Department.

"It is critical that we provide fire departments - especially those in under-resourced regions - with the support they need to protect the communities they serve." said Rick Martinez, Executive Director of the California Fire Foundation. "The donation from General Motors allowed us to provide vital aid to local fire departments in greatest need of additional firefighting resources and for that we are truly grateful."



GRANT NEWS

In 2021, the California Fire Foundation awarded over \$1.78 million in grants to help fire departments, firefighter associations and community-based organizations actively address some of the state's toughest wildfire and disaster prevention, preparedness, relief, and recovery needs.

Last year, we awarded grants to 62 fire departments/local firefighter associations and 64 community-based organizations across California focusing on a wide range of projects.

Our statewide funding cycle is now open and will be accepting grant applications through June 17.

Here are just a few of the organizations we were proud to support with grant funding in 2021:

Project: Camp

The days immediately following a wildfire evacuation, or a disaster are highly uncertain, stressful, and anxious days. At Project: Camp they help parents and care givers find normalcy for their family by providing day camps for their kids that are fun, immersive, and safe. While kids have a blast at camp, parents have the time and space to get back on their feet.

During the Caldor Fire in 2021, the California California Fire Foundation supported their on-the-ground efforts and enabled Project: Camp to run a camp in Reno, NV, where many people were temporarily located to during the evacuations across El Dorado County.

"Thanks to the support from California Fire Foundation we served about 35-60 campers per day for 10 days with the help of 21 local volunteers. Our campers were from families that were evacuated from the South Lake Tahoe and surrounding communities, some who had lost homes, as well as children of first responders. Our parents shared the relief and support they felt from having full-day programming for their kids that allowed them to do what they needed to support their family, deal with the effects of the fire, and have the space to support their own mental health and wellbeing."

Good Farm Fund:

The California Fire Foundation awarded grants to the Good Farm Fund to provide Mendocino and Lake County farms and agricultural workers with direct wildfire relief and recovery assistance. Our grants also helped support local farms in becoming fire ready and improving their fire resilience.

Jeannie Elizabeth Kelly of Coming Home to Country Farm in Clearlake will use the grant to replace fencing destroyed during the Sulphur Bank Fire in 2017 and remove burned trees that are falling on existing fencing.

"Two years after the Sulphur Bank Fire burned through my property, I was still struggling to get my head above water when the COVID-19 pandemic hit," shared Kelly. "Had it not been for the Good Farm Fund grant to provide the big boost I needed; I don't know how my farm would have survived."

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911 AT EASE INTERNATIONAL (SANTA BARBARA AND SAN LUIS OBISPO CHAPTERS)

First responders operate in trauma-based professions where emotional injury is a common side effect with work-related situations and events. 911 At Ease International provides first responders, and their family members, with access to free, professional, confidential, local, trauma-informed counseling and therapy. In addition to individual counseling, 911 At Ease also provides substance abuse group meetings, support group meetings, equine therapy, canine therapy, and critical incident response support to departments and agencies during their time of need.

With California Fire Foundation's funding partnership, they served over 1,000 first responders and their immediate family members across the Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo counties during this past year. The important, mission-focused work of 911 At Ease translated into a number of success stories in 2021, including saved lives (prevented suicides), saved marriages, and first responder resiliency.
